National Army Museum Announces Fall Events Schedule

Special events include Fall Symposium, Veterans Day commemoration, and activities for current traveling exhibition "Loyal Service: Working Dogs at War"

Fort Belvoir, Va.— The National Museum of the United States Army and The Army Historical Foundation are hosting a series of special events this fall that explore the heritage and history of the U.S. Army.

Fall 2023 Symposium: Army Leadership from Washington to Powell *October 20: 8:30 a.m. – 4:30 p.m.*

This free, day-long event will feature presentations by historical authors and historians about case studies in Army leadership from the Continental Army through today. Information about seminar sessions can be found on the Museum's website. Registration is required for both in-person and virtual attendance.

Military Police Working Dog Demonstration October 28: 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m.

Watch U.S. Army Soldiers from the 947th Military Police Detachment and their four-legged partners demonstrate each dog's speed, agility, and discipline through training scenarios and drills on Warriors' Field. After the demonstration, visitors will have the opportunity to talk with the handlers and interact with select dogs. This free outdoor event is weather dependent and a companion program to the traveling exhibition, *Loyal Service: Working Dogs at War*, now on display in the Special Exhibition Gallery.

At Ease Service Dog Event October 28: 4:00-6:00 p.m.

This free public program is for visitors to enjoy late afternoon access to the Museum with additional modifications to provide a more sensory-friendly environment. Anxiety coping devices will be available at the Welcome Desk. Service dogs and miniature ponies are allowed during this program as well as during normal operating hours. A hands-on special educational program and docent-led tours will be available.

Loyal Service: Working Dogs at War "Meet the Artist" Gallery Talk November 2: 10:00 a.m.-11:30 a.m.

The public is invited to a gallery talk with renowned artist James Mellick. Mellick will describe the process and purpose behind his creation of 16 wooden sculptures featured in the Museum's current special exhibit *Loyal Service: Working Dogs at War*. The traveling exhibit, which is open to all Museum visitors, features sculptures that symbolize the sacrifice of those dogs who have served in war alongside their service member handlers.

Note: Mellick extends his Museum visit to attend The Army Historical Foundation's after hours Annual Members' Meeting & Dinner as the event guest speaker.
